TEAS

Darjeeling

Often called the champagne of teas, this fine Indian tea is grown on the foothills of the Himalayas. It has a rich flavour and a fine bouquet reminiscent of Muscatel.

Oolong

This is the most expensive of teas and is often called "Liquid Sunshine". It has a fragrant peach-like flavour and produces a straw coloured liquor.

Russian

This is often called Georgian tea because it is cultivated in the republic of Georgia in Russia. It is best taken with lemon.

China

This tea is from the Ankei province of China. It is blend of traditional black tea and has a delicate flavour.

Pelham Mixture

This is a blend of different China teas and scented with jasmine and bergamot.

Assam

From north-east India this tea has brittle blackish leaves which gives a reddish tea with a brisk strong flavour.

Earl Grey

Named after the nineteenth century British statesman the second Earl Grey, who was given the recipe as a result of a diplomatic mission to China. It is a blend of China teas mixed with oil of bergamot.

Lapsang Souchong

The best is from the Fujian Province of China and has a very distinctive aroma and flavour. It is best taken without milk but perhaps with a slice of lemon.

Lemon Zinger

Lemon rind, split red and green chillis, infused with honey and hot water.

Fresh mint tea

Freshly picked small headed mint leaves, gently infused in boiling water producing a wonderful refreshing herbal tea.

EXOTIC TEAS

Lotus flower

Flavoured China tea.

Mango Indian

A blend of India and China teas.

Spice Tea Imperial

Delicate Ceylon growth, mixed with Zanzibar cloves and orange peel.

Vanilla

Ceylon, India and China blend mixed with chopped vanilla.
